How to Apply for Financial Aid:

Complete all steps below to apply for financial aid. **Note: The student loans available for this program are not based on financial need. Teacher Loan Forgiveness Details:

If you and your school qualify, this program may provide loan forgiveness for eligible Federal Direct Loans. This is a separate program requiring separate forms and processes. The U.S. Department of Education will determine your eligibility for this program. Grand View University is not responsible to verify your eligibility for this or any other program. Please do not base your enrollment on this program as it can be difficult to ensure qualification for Government Programs, which are subject to reform and funding changes.

Teach Grant Details:

The Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant Program provides up to \$4,000 a year in grant assistance to students who are completing coursework towards certain high-need fields. In order to be eligible for a grant, a student must submit a FAFSA, sign an Agreement to Serve as a full-time teacher at certain low-income schools and within certain high-need fields for at least four academic years within eight years after completing (or ceasing enrollment in) the course of study for which the candidate received a grant. Grandview University certifies your eligibility for the TEACH Grant. The TEACH Grant converts to an unsubsidized Direct Loan if the student fails to fulfill any part of his or her obligation. This loan, plus interest, must be repaid.

Pay-As-You-Go payment plans are available for tuition.

Federal Student Loans are also available for graduate students.

NOTICE: Your tuition will be due the Friday before your classes begin. If you do not have financial aid in place, you may have to make payments until your student loans are fully processed.

ENROLL IN A PAYMENT PLAN:

Grand View has partnered with Official Payments to offer a secure, convenient and interest-free way to automatically withdraw payments from your banking account or credit card over the course of the semester. You may also choose to initiate the payment. The GV Payment Plan allows students to divide the total amount due from the billing statement over the course of the semester.

COMMON QUESTIONS:

What is a payment plan?

A payment plan is an alternative method of covering the out of pocket balance beyond Financial Aid. There is no interest with a payment plan but rather a one-time set up fee that is listed below when setting up the plan. Payments are due the 5th of each month but you have until the 20th of each month to make the payment before late fees are assessed.

What are the price differences between the Fall-Only and Annual plans?

- Fall-Only plans: You would pay a \$40 non-refundable fee when setting up the plan. (If you believe you're going to need another plan again in the Spring, it would benefit you to set up an Annual plan.)
- Annual plans: You would pay a \$50 non-refundable fee when setting up the plan.

How do you determine what amount to include in my payment plan?

- Fall-Only plans: We suggest that you review your statement for the fall semester and use the remaining balance after grants, scholarships and loans are applied.
- Annual plans: We suggest that you review your statement for fall semester and use the remaining balance after grants, scholarships and loans are applied and multiply this amount times two. If you expect to have any changes in your charges or financial aid between your fall and spring semesters, you will need to take that into consideration as well.

How do I pay my bill?

Credit card payments may also be made via telephone at the Business Office (515-263-2807). We are able to accept MasterCard, Visa, Discover, and American Express. A service fee of 2.35% is charged to all credit or debit card transactions.

For M.Ed. students, Grand View University requires official transcripts from baccalaureate-granting institution's, showing a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance.) If you have copies of your transcripts available, they can be submitted as unofficial transcripts to expedite the admission process; however, official, sealed transcripts are required in order to be fully admitted to Grand View University.

Applicants enrolling in a stand-alone endorsement program will only need to submit an official transcript from the college/university where the teaching bachelor's degree was received. Follow the steps below to request official transcripts.

TO ORDER TRANSCRIPTS:

There are multiple ways to request transcripts, and each college or university will have their own process. Typically, the easiest way to order official transcripts is:

- 1** Contact the Registrar's office at your previously attended school, either by phone, email, or through your university's website.
- 2** Submit a transcript request following that school's procedures. Most colleges and universities require a signature or other official request in writing. Many schools have a Transcript Request Form available to download on the Registrar's website. Some will allow you to order transcripts online.
- 3** It can often take several days for a transcript request to be processed. When your transcripts are received, the Graduate Information Office will contact you, but if you have not received confirmation within 14 days, please contact us at (515)-416-9045.

Current teachers interested in advancing their career in areas related to culturally relevant teacher leadership. Students can select one endorsement area and pair it with the core to earn a full master's degree, but also have the option to choose flexible courses from a variety of endorsement areas. A minimum of 33 credit hours is required to earn a full Master's in Education.

What you learn:

Throughout the 15 credits in the Master's in Education Core courses, students will:

- develop the attitudes, dispositions, and skills needed to lead in multicultural educational settings
- examine theoretical and historical issues that affect the culture and climate of schools and that require school leaders to be culturally competent, relevant, and responsive
- explore and examine their individual leadership styles and will understand processes of school improvement and second order change
- analyze and use data to better understand student achievement and school environment
- explore a variety of strategies and models for creating a collaborative culture and will develop the effective communication skills required of teacher leaders, instructional coaches and mentors
- use data, gap analysis, and action planning to prioritize professional development needs
- apply adult learning theory and Universal Design for Learning to plan and implement professional development for classroom teachers
- understand the major legal and policy issues that are affecting schools in the 21st century
- create organized and planned partnership programs that foster an environment which encourages families and community stakeholders to become actively involved and contribute to students' academic success
- apply the legal, economic, and social implications of major policy initiatives at the local, state, and federal levels and how to advocate for students' and other stakeholders' needs within policy frameworks.
- explore the strengths and limitations of and apply various research designs in education to improve PK-12 student achievement

How you learn:

Fully Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of the Culturally Responsive Teacher Leadership core courses (15 credits), along with completion of the selected endorsement coursework, students will have earned a Master's in Education. Students completing the program improve their effectiveness in the classroom, become teacher leaders within their own classrooms, and advance their career based on the selected endorsement.

Prerequisites:

Highly qualified general education teachers who are interested in advancing their career and becoming prepared to meet the needs of culturally and linguistically diverse students in the general education classroom.

What you learn:

Students gain expertise in: various language acquisition theories and methods of instruction; understanding of linguistic challenges that are encountered by Culturally Linguistically Diverse students in schools; and applying linguistic concepts in educational contexts, such as, phonology, morphology, and etymology of words.

How you learn:

Fully Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. While there are no face-to-face meetings, some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing. You will also have a field experience and be provided an opportunity to design and deliver instruction for ELL students and consider their experiences in schools and the community.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of the English Language Learners Endorsement, students are able to advance their career and increase their teaching opportunities. Students are prepared to teach English language learners K-12, become more effective with teaching English Language Learners in their own classrooms, or become a mentor teacher to assist other educators in effectively meeting the needs of English Language Learners.

Prerequisites:

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current or pending license to teach in the state of Iowa.

Current teachers interested in advancing their career to become in teacher leadership, collaboration, and coaching, and earning graduate level certification in Instructional Coaching.

What you learn:

Would you like to be an instructional coach, mentor, master teacher, academic dean, or reading or writing coach? You can pursue this certificate while you complete the MEd, or separately. This certification provides further leadership training in a variety of styles, strategies, and models. Students will develop the effective communication skills and dispositions required of teacher leaders to create a collaborative culture and implement effective research-based professional development and evaluation tools. Students will learn how to use data and action planning to prioritize professional development needs, navigate resistance from stakeholders, and apply research based teaching and instructional models to plan and implement effective professional development.

How you learn:

Fully Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. While there are no face-to-face meetings, some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing.

Internship: This certification also allows students the opportunity to spend time in the field and learn from an instructional coach or someone who performs instructional coaching duties (e.g., principal, dean, etc.). All internship opportunities will be completed under the supervision of a Grand View Internship supervisor, who you will meet with via Zoom three times during the course of the internship. In this experience, you will be able to apply the research based practices and theory that you have learned in the leadership courses to actual classroom experiences with teachers, including designing and implementing professional development.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of the Instructional Coaching Certificate, students are able to advance their career and earn graduate level certificate. Students become prepared to operate in leadership positions within K-12 schools, coach and mentor other teachers, and assist in professional development opportunities within the K-12 community.

Prerequisites:

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current or pending license to teach in the state of Iowa.

Degree Requirements:

*The Instructional Coaching Certificate is a 10 credit certificate. However, 9 of the credit hours are already included in Grand View's Masters of Education program, making it easy to earn a Master's along with graduate certification.

For:

Current teachers interested in teaching and working with students with special needs. These teachers are ready to address social, academic, and behavioral goals of students with mild and moderate disabilities who spend much of their day working with same age peers. This requires teachers to be collaborative partners with colleagues and families.

What you learn:

The Instructional Strategist Endorsement focuses on preparing teachers to work in K-8 or 5-12 mild/moderate instruction settings. Graduates become equipped to work with students using evidence-based practices that meet the needs in rapidly changing school settings. You will learn to create accommodations to enable students to access grade level content. Teachers pursuing this endorsement will learn to pre-teach, teach, and reteach skills in ways that make sense to learners at a wide variety of ability levels. You will learn principles of universal design for learning.

How you learn:

Fully Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing. The Instructional Strategist I program includes a 40-hour practicum that can often be completed in the teacher's own building or district. Students will receive regular feedback from a university supervisor on their teaching practices.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of this program, students will have earned an endorsement to teach Instructional Strategist I. This qualifies teachers to work with students with mild or moderate disabilities. This may be in a collaborative setting, a classroom, or a special education setting.

Prerequisites:

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current or pending license to teach in the state of Iowa.

Current teachers who desire to become prepared to serve students with behavior disorders and learning disabilities.

What you learn:

The Instructional Strategist II: LD/BD focuses on preparing teachers to serve students with significant learning disabilities and behavioral disorders in school settings. Graduates gain expertise in instructional interventions, learning methods, educational alternatives and strategies, and related services to help students with exceptionalities. You will gain knowledge of the social, emotional, and behavioral characteristics and development of students with learning disabilities and behavioral disorders, including the impact of such characteristics on classroom learning as well as associated domains.

How you learn:

Fully Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing. For Instructional Strategist II: LD/BD practicum, you will be placed in local special education classrooms to observe and apply teaching methods and classroom management strategies with emphasis on special education students with behavior and/or learning disabilities.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of this program, students earn the endorsement to teach Instructional Strategist II: LD/BD. Graduates gain expertise in overseeing classroom programs and curriculum, monitoring weekly and daily improvement of learning goals, and modifying any instructional methods that might not be achieving those goals. Because this is a K-12 endorsement, students will be exposed to several age levels of students and may work with students in their own setting – if applicable. Students will receive regular feedback from a university supervisor on their teaching practices.

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current license to teach in the state of Iowa.

Graduates become equipped to work with students who have intellectual disabilities using evidence-based practices that meet the needs in rapidly changing school settings.

You'll consider how to use technologies to support instructional assessment, planning, and delivery for a wide range of students with exceptionalities.

Students will learn how to collaborate across a wide range of settings in order to advocate for students with exceptionalities in the school and community.

Students will learn to collaborate with various service providers and educators in the school in order to deliver instruction to a wide range of students.

How you learn:

Online: You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing. Because this is a K-12 endorsement, students will be exposed to several age levels of students during practicum experiences and may work with students in their own setting – if applicable. Students will receive regular feedback from a university supervisor on their teaching practices.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of this program, students earn the endorsement required to teach Instructional Strategist II. Graduates gain expertise in overseeing classroom programs and curriculum, monitoring weekly and daily improvement of learning goals, and modifying any instructional methods that might not be achieving those goals.

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current or pending license to teach in the state of Iowa.

Current elementary or secondary science, math, or industrial technology teachers who desire to gain expertise in teaching science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and/or interdisciplinary STEM teaching and instructional coaching.

What you learn:

Students strengthen their ability to teach STEM subjects and gain expertise in integrating STEM education teaching strategies into the classroom.

How you learn:

Hybrid: This program is hybrid and has a face to face requirement. Face-to-face, you will have the unique opportunity to participate live in STEM teaching experiences. The instructors will model relevant STEM activities and debrief with the teachers about STEM pedagogy, philosophy, management, and practical application in the classroom. For the online activities, students will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, recorded and/or live webinars, and various web links for viewing. Lastly, students seeking the STEM endorsement will have the opportunity to participate in a 30-hour STEM Field Experience, choosing a personally relevant STEM research experience; STEM internship at a STEM business or informal education organization; STEM extracurricular professional development or leadership activity.

Career Outcomes:

Upon completion of this program, students earn the STEM Endorsement and are prepared to operate in teaching roles related to Science, Technology, Engineering, Math, and interdisciplinary STEM based upon all other courses completed. Teachers may advance as department leaders, instructional coaches, or have increased opportunities for interdisciplinary teaching at the elementary- and middle-level.

Prerequisites:

Students applying to this program must hold a baccalaureate degree earned from a regionally accredited institution, a validated minimum undergraduate grade-point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (Students below 3.0 will be considered for provisional acceptance), and a current or pending license to teach in the state of Iowa. Students seeking the Secondary 5-8 STEM endorsement must be the holder of a 5-12 science, mathematics, or industrial technology endorsement or 5-8 middle school mathematics or science endorsement.

Students learn the business of sport, including management, leadership, and operational skills that will prepare students for opportunities in the sport and recreation industry. The curriculum, dedicated faculty, and experiential learning, enable students to develop content knowledge in several contexts, professional dispositions, ethical-decision making, reflective thinking, and written and oral communication skills.

How you learn:

This unique program offers students learning experiences in a variety of formats, including face-to-face courses, blended hybrid courses, and fully online courses. Students outside the Des Moines area can also attend the face-to-face courses remotely. Experiential learning in sport management is crucial to students gaining or expanding their experience in sport and refining career intentions. At Grand View, we have developed relationships with organizations that provide multiple internship opportunities in the Des Moines community and beyond, as well as graduate assistantships in a variety of fields.

Career Outcomes:

Grand View's M.S. in Sport Management program prepares students for managerial positions in sport organizations, including marketing, event management, or communications positions for professional sport teams or leagues, collegiate athletic administration and coaching, or positions in a wide range of private and public sport and recreation organizations. Individuals who complete the MSSM degree, and have a valid coaching authorization, are also able to apply for authorization to hold an active role as an Athletic/Activities administrator in the state of Iowa. Grand View's MSSM degree meets the requirements set by the Iowa State Board of Educational Examiners, allowing individuals who do not have a teaching degree to become Authorized Athletics/Activities Administrators.

What you learn:

Students will learn how to organize a driver and safety education program, become prepared to teach student drivers to develop skills and attitudes that support safe driving, and gain expertise and knowledge on the curriculum of Driver Education.

How you learn:

Students complete courses fully online. You will log into Blackboard to complete assignments, participate in online discussions, and complete group activities. Some of the activities may include chats, discussion boards, and various web links for viewing. This endorsement also includes 16 hours of practicum in behind the wheel instruction.

Career Outcomes:

For licensed K-12 educators, completion of the program qualifies individuals to teach classroom instruction and behind the wheel components of driver education.

Prerequisites:

A valid teaching license is required to obtain the Driver and Safety Education Endorsement and Behind the Wheel authorization. **State requirements for BTW Instructor-** you must be at least 25 years old, have a valid driver's license that permits unaccompanied driving, and have a clear driving record for the previous two years as defined in Iowa Administrative subrule 761-634.7(c).
